STARTING YOUR OWN BUSINESS

BUDGETING

Open a bank account first, if you don't already have one, because it will cost you less to cash a cheque and you won't have to carry a bunch of money.

Free Tip: when shopping around for a bank, make sure you find out about service fees and other charges.



There are four basic ways to buy things: cash, cheque, bankcard (debit) or credit card. If you use a credit card like Visa/Mastercard, you are promising to pay later therefore you pay interest. You are not charged interest if you use cash or a bankcard but some places charge service fees each time you use a card or a cheque.

Some basic budget tips:

- 1. Pay for the essentials first like rent, utilities and food.
- 2. Distinguish the difference between wants and needs.
- 3. Allow for unexpected expenses save a little extra just in case.
- 4. To avoid debt, pay with cash or bankcard.
- 5. Have only one major credit card.
- 6. If you have debt, arrange to pay it off at an affordable rate every week or so.
- If you have debt and would like to have someone help you figure out how to pay it off, you can contact Credit Counseling of Atlantic Canada at 1-888-753-2227.

BANKING

Looking for a bank? Do you have other banking needs?

Provincial banks are great but they are standardized. This means that negotiation and small changes don't happen. However Credit Union's are partially owned by the members. This means that you have a say in how things work and you have some control over your personal banking, therefore more flexibility. Your loans and credit needs can be assessed at any bank or at a local credit union. The following two credit unions exist in Lunenburg and Queens County:

SETTING A JOB
